Finland Education - A Model for Dallas Schools?

According to an article by JIM LANDERS in the Dallas Morning News, this is likely to be the case.

The article states that by the time Finland's children complete the ninth grade, they speak three languages. They have studied algebra, geometry and statistics since the first grade.

In math, science, problem solving and reading comprehension, Finland's 15-year-olds came out at or near the top in international tests given in 2000, 2003 and 2006. Even the least among Finnish students -- the lowest 10 percent -- beat their peers everywhere else.

Education has a special role in Finland's national story. Six-hundred years of Swedish rule ended in 1809 when Finland became a Russian duchy. Finland gained its independence in 1917 under the leadership of teachers more than politicians or soldiers. Yet, by the 1960s, public education was so bad that parents were moving their children en masse to private schools. A forecast predicted that by 1972, only one-fourth of Finland's children would be attending public schools.

Finland's equivalent of "No Child Left Behind" passed the Parliament in 1968 at the initiative of the conservatives. The law called for a uniform, national curriculum for both public and private schools.

The educational system has undergone continuous changes. It has become less rigid and added some flexibility. Evaluation and change goes on continually throughout the system.

Finland is a small country which has to compete for science and technology.
