25TH FINNFEST-COME CELEBRATE Duluth, MN, July 23-27, 2008

Calling all Finns, Finnish Americans and friends of Finnish culture nationwide is the invitation from Jeanne Doty and Diane Fay Skomars, co-chairs of FinnFest 2008,. "We want to welcome everyone. It is open to everyone."

FinnFest USA 2008 celebrates its 25th festival this year takes place in Duluth, MN, July 23-27, 2008. The theme for FinnFest 2008 is "Sharing the Spirit of Finland" and will honor Finnish culture and heritage. It is expected to attract 7,000-10,000 people to its performances of dance, concerts, lectures, art exhibitions and tours.

The Minnesota Orchestra directed by the Finnish Music Director Osmo Vänskä will be a highlieht of the five-day celebration.

The President of Finland, Tarja Halonen, has been officially invited to attend the event and the FinnFest 2008 organizing committee is hopeful to host Her Honor along with other dignitaries from Finland.

The first FinnFest event was organized in 1983 in Minneapolis, and has enjoyed a robust history since.

For the past 25 years, FinnFest USA has been the beacon of Finnish- American ethnic identity in the United States. Since the first FinnFest the festival has been hosted in fifteen different states and has joined forces with the Canadian Finnish Grand Fest twice.

Programming at this year's FinnFest includes later generation Finnish-Americans working with Finns currently living and working in the United States.

Today, FinnFest is international. It is more than a Finnish-American Festival. It brings people of Finnish descent and friends of Finnish culture together from around the world.

FINNISH CITIZENSHIP - ACT BEFORE MAY 31ST 2008

Opportunity for Finnish citizenship - act before May 31st 2008

Under the new Nationality Act, which came into effect on June 1, 2003, former Finnish citizens and their descendants may now regain Finnish citizenship through a declaration procedure.

Former Finnish citizens have the opportunity to re-acquire Finnish citizenship by declaration, if they have lost it when acquiring the citizenship of another country, for example. Descendants of former and current Finnish citizens may also acquire Finnish citizenship by declaration, even if they have never had citizenship.

Please note: The declaration must be received by the Consulates General or the Embassy of Finland on 31 May, 2008, at the latest.

There is a processing fee charged for the declaration. You can verify the current fee from the Services section of this website or by calling one of the Finnish missions in the US.


You can download the declaration forms from the webpage of the Directorate of Immigration at Finland. Also, the Consulates General or the Embassy of Finland can send it to you by request.

Return the completed form to the Consulates General or the Embassy of Finland in person or by mail; do not return the form to authorities in Finland if you are only visiting the country. Thank you,

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FINNISH ACTRESS - MAILA NURMI

Maila Nurmi portrayed Vampira, a vivacious vampire who hosted scary late-night movies during the 1950s. By Jocelyn Y. Stewart, Los Angeles Times Staff Writer January 16, 2008

In the early days of television, when horror movies were often campy by nature, actress Maila Nurmi created the character Vampira, a glamorous ghoul who as hostess of latenight fright films in the 1950s layered on her own brand of camp.

The character won Nurmi short-lived fame and a dedicated cult following. Nurmi claimed that Vampira also was the uncredited inspiration for later ghoulish yet glamorous you family roots. female characters in film and television, including Elvira.

Nurmi was found dead Jan. 10 in her Hollywood home. The cause of death was still being investigated, said Lt. Fred Corral of the Los Angeles County coroner's office.

Nurmi was believed to be 85, although sources offer conflicting dates of birth.

Born Maila Syrjäniemi in Finland, Nurmi immigrated to the United States when she was a toddler. By age 17, she had dropped her surname and taken on that of her famous uncle Paavo Nurmi, a world- class runner known as the "Flying Finn." In her teens, she moved to New York, and then to Los Angeles, to pursue a career in acting.

Little came of Nurmi's efforts to land conventional leading roles in theater or on screen.

"I'm a lady linoleum-layer," she told a Times reporter in 1962. "And if things are slow in linoleum, I can also do carpentry, make drapes or refinish furniture." And for 99 cents toured the University of Washington and Boeing and gave a an hour, she cleaned celebrity houses, she told Entertainment Weekly in 1994.

Nurmi's influence can be seen in today's teen "goth" look, said Dana Gould, a longtime friend of Nurmi.

FINLAND EXCELLS!

What's the secret?

It starts with a high-quality education and follows with strong support for innovation, said Prime Minister Matti Vanhanen, in an interview during his visit to Seattle Thursday.

"Very close and good cooperation between universities and corporations" is important too, he said. "Both companies and thestate are investing a lot into research and development."

The home of mobile-phone giant Nokia, Finland spends 3.5 percent of its GDP on research, while the U.S. spends 2.7 percent. Education in Finland, including university study, is

In his first visit to the U.S. he met with Vice President Dick Cheney, California Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger and Google founders Larry Page and Sergey Brin.

On Thursday, he met with Microsoft Chairman Bill Gates, speech to a Seattle business group.

He was too busy to visit Ballard, home of Seattle's Scandinavian roots, but he did visit the UW, where he was impressed to learn the university offers classes in Finnish Director Tim Burton's film about Wood, starring Johnny language and culture through its Department of Scandinavian Studies.

> Finland is taking a lead on energy issues. While the country usesjust as much energy per capita as the U.S., it produces less carbon-dioxide emissions because it gets almost 30 percent of its energy from renewable sources, such as hydropower and biomass, converting waste from paper mills and the forestry industry into electricity and heat, Vanhanen said.

To cut emissions from cars, Finland is proposing to base its annual registration and vehicle taxes on a vehicle's carbondioxide emissions. The move would encourage production and consumption of low-emission cars, which would be taxed at a much lower rate, he said.

Finland's weather apparently is not dampening the mood -- a U.K. study pronounced it the sixth happiest nation in the world, despite a winter that includes 51 days without sun.

With 96 percent of the tech-savvy population using mobile phones, what kind of phone does its 52-year-old prime minister use? Nokia's latest smartphone, the E90. Does it beam him up? "Not yet," said his press secretary. "It's in the works."
