NEW AT SALOLAMPI THIS SUMMER—

News from the Finlandia Foundation President aboutSalolampi's new music camp.

As you may have heard already the Finlandia Foundation National is embarking upon an exciting new program called Soiva Camp at Salolampi. This music camp will start this June in Bemidji, MN with the campers living at Salolampi and taking their instruction at Bemidji State University. This initial camp will be a pilot program limited to 25 students and the two instruments that will be taught at this first camp are piano and flute. We are asking that the student campers have had two years of private instruction and the age range is 11-17 years.

It will be possible to use the FFN "first time camper" scholarships for this and other scholarships are available from the Salolampi Foundation IF YOU ACT QUICKLY! The student teacher ratio will be 5:1 and three of the instructors will come from the Association of Finnish Music Schools (flute, piano and improvisation/composition) while the two American instructors come from Concordia College/ Moorhead (flute) and Bemidji State University (piano). FINNISH CITIZENSHIP - ACT BEFORE MAY 31ST 2008

Opportunity for Finnish citizenship - act before May 31st 2008

Under the new Nationality Act, which came into effect on June 1, 2003, former Finnish citizens and their descendants may now regain Finnish citizenship through a declaration procedure.

Former Finnish citizens have the opportunity to re-acquire Finnish citizenship by declaration, if they have lost it when acquiring the citizenship of another country, for example. Descendants of former and current Finnish citizens may also acquire Finnish citizenship by declaration, even if they have never had citizenship.

Please note: The declaration must be received by the Consulates General or the Embassy of Finland on 31 May, 2008, at the latest.

There is a processing fee charged for the declaration. You can verify the current fee from the Services section of this website or by calling one of the Finnish missions in the US.

You can download the declaration forms from the webpage of the Directorate of Immigration at Finland. Also, the Consulates General or the Embassy of Finland can send it to you by request.

Return the completed form to the Consulates General or the Embassy of Finland in person or by mail; do not return the form to authorities in Finland if you are only visiting the country. Thank you.

More about: SALOLAMPI -



FINLAND EXCELS!

First, a medical break-through has taken place in Finland. Scientists in Finland have replaced the upper jaw of 65 year old man with a bone graft that had been grown from his own cells.

The patient had lost his upper jaw because of tumors.

The stem cells came from the man's fatty tissue and were cultivated for two weeks. The scientists selected a set of cells called mesenchymal cells, those that give rise to bone tissue. Those cells were placed in a scaffold structure. The structure was than placed inside the patient's abdomen and allowed to grow for nine months. Than the grown structure was taken from the abdomen and placed where the upper jaw should be. Screws and microsurgery were used to connect the structure to the head and blood vessels were connected to the arteries in his neck.

Dr. Riitta Suuronen, head of Regea Institute of Regenerative Medicine in Helsinki, told a news conference recently, "From the outside nobody would be able to tell that he has been through such a procedure."

An in-flight video shown on Finnair flights has won a prestigious award, again.

The Finnair short film, "Welcome to Lakeland", was awarded the Silver World Medal prize in the in-flight entertainment category at the New York Film and Video Festival.

The award is the twelfth of its kind carned by Finnair's inflight films.

This year's competition had 212 films from 25 countries. At the "Jussi" Award ceremonies, Finland's version of the Oscar, the film "Black Ice", has received 6 Jussi's. They include the best film, leading actress, director, script, music, and editing.

WHAT MAKES FINNISH KIDS SO SMART?

Ellen Gamerman of the Wallstreet Journal wrote an article on February 29th, 2008 about the excellence of Finnish high school students.

Finnish students have only about 30 minutes of homework every night, no societies, no valedictorians, no tardy bells or classes for the gifted. Yet on an international level they score among the highest of 15-year-old students in 57 countries tested.


